
**TOWN OF WENTWORTH
TOWN COUNCIL MEETING
MINUTES
July 1, 2008
7:00 P.M.**

The Wentworth Town Council held their regular monthly meeting in the Town Hall meeting room at the National Guard Armory, on **Tuesday, July 1, 2008, at 7:00 p.m.**

Council members present: Mayor Dennis Paschal, Mayor Pro Tem Evelyn Conner, Councilwoman Iris Powell, Councilman Robert Aswell, and Councilman James Belcher

Staff Present: Brenda Ward, Town Clerk / Yvonne Russell, Finance Officer / Town Attorney, Fred Baggett / Deputy Clarence Cheshire

Article I. Mayor Paschal called the meeting to order.

Article II. Mayor Paschal gave the **Invocation.**

Article III. **Discussion / Revisions / Adoption of Agenda**

A. Requests and Petitions of Citizens

Mayor Paschal noted that several residents signed the Speaker Register to address Council regarding a speed limit in University Estates—**Mrs. Glenda Koops** was the spokesperson for the group. Also, **Bonnie Dickens** signed the Speaker Register for ReDirections.

Mayor Paschal made a motion, *“To revise the July 1st Agenda to add Ms. Dickens, Mrs. Koops and others, under ‘Public Comments’ and, to add Item G. under New Business—Consideration of Approval of Contract with the Wright Company for Construction of Town Hall.”*

Mayor Pro Tem Conner seconded the motion. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

Article IV. **Approval of Town Council Meeting Minutes**

A. Town Council Meeting – June 3, 2008

Mayor Paschal asked if there were any corrections to the Minutes of the Town Council Meeting for June 3, 2008. There were no corrections.

Councilman Belcher made a motion, *“The Minutes be approved as presented.”*

Mayor Pro Tem Conner seconded the motion. There was no discussion. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

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Article V. New Business

A. Consideration of “Contract with Rouse, Rouse, Penn & Rouse” to Audit Accounts of the Town of Wentworth”

Mayor Paschal compared the figures in last year’s audit contract to their latest proposal, noting “about a five percent (5%) increase.”

Councilman Belcher commented that Rouse, Rouse, Penn and Rouse have done an excellent job for the Town in the past, and made a motion “*To approve the contract.*”

Councilwoman Iris Powell seconded the motion. There was no further discussion. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

B. Consideration of Secondary Subdivision Plat for Betty J. Archer

Mayor Paschal said he was very familiar with the location and that, “This appears to be a simple division of land, breaking off a lot.”

The **mayor** made a motion, “*That we approve the secondary subdivision plat for Betty J. Archer.*”

Councilwoman Powell seconded the motion. There was no discussion. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

Note: Mayor Paschal skipped *Item C* by mistake...addressed it later in the meeting.

D. Committee Reports

1. Recreation Committee – Consideration of Committee’s Request for Council to Readdress Possibility of Leasing old Wentworth School Gym / Ball Fields

Mayor Paschal invited **Mr. Richard Capps**, Chairman of the Recreation Committee, to address Council.

Mr. Capps thanked the Council for the opportunity to give them a report on the Recreation Committee’s progress. He referenced a summary that he would provide council, as well. (*Note: Copy attached hereto as part of these Minutes*)

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Mr. Capps reviewed the committee's goals—(1) Research and make use of existing recreational assets in Wentworth; (2) connect facilities in the town center through a multiuse trail system; and (3) provide places for organized sports.

Mr. Capps continued, "We are willing to be the liaison to try to bring things together to meet these goals, so we can all take advantage of what is here in Wentworth."

"In regards to organized sports, we are sharing some of the facilities with the high school and the community college, but there is a great need for this on a full-time basis, because there are times when we need the facilities and cannot use them for various reasons."

Mr. Capps explained, "In doing some research and with the advice of Mrs. Ward (Town Clerk), we learned that the Town has approached the County, asking to purchase or lease the Old Wentworth School gym and ball fields. In discussion with Mr. Tom Robinson (County Manager), we learned that the County Commissioners are now likely to look favorably on a renewal of the Town's request."

"We therefore are presenting a formal request that the Mayor and Town Council ask for discussion with the County Manager regarding the Town's purchasing or leasing the Old Wentworth School Gym and ball fields."

Mr. Capps referred to a letter the Council previously sent to Mr. Robinson, and explained that the committee would like for them to resubmit the letter.

Mr. Capps said he would be glad to answer questions from Council. He added, "The Committee got together and did a lot of Q & A, trying to be sure we covered all the bases as far as inspection of the school, what needs to be done, what has been done, safety issues and so forth."

The **Town Administrator** said she would like to comment—"Eugene Russell, the County Attorney called today and asked about this agenda item...said he was curious about it. I explained to him that Mrs. Butler ("T" Butler, member of the Recreation Committee) has had some conversations with Mr. Robinson about this, and that he suggested we send another request."

Mrs. Ward said **Mr. Russell** seemed very favorable toward the idea.

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Mayor Paschal asked Council if they had any questions for Mr. Capps.

Councilman Belcher asked, “Do you have an appraisal or any idea of what preparation may be needed for the ball fields? I haven’t been down there in quite some time, so I’m not sure what shape they’re in.”

Mr. Capps replied, “...we are very blessed in a lot of ways...I approached the Town Council...at least two years ago now about this, and I have now been asked to chair this committee, which is a great honor for me. But what I wanted to say is, we have enough people interested, and there is some momentum now for getting something done. I really think the costs will be minor...I have a friend, Jeff Smith, who is a landscaper and has the equipment, and *I* have the equipment...there are many folks with the means and the time to put into it.”

He added, “This is something very dear to my heart...the kids don’t have anywhere to go. It’s not going to take anything but a little elbow grease and some strong backs to do some of this stuff.”

Councilwoman Powell commented, “If everyone pulls together, you can do it.”

Mr. Capps replied, “That’s right, and to answer your question, I don’t think the cost will be much at all, if any...there are so many people who are willing to volunteer...and we’re talking as far as *field* preparation is concerned. As for the part of the school that we are looking at, a lot of the work has already been done. I think a heating and air conditioning unit have been put in, and as far as the gym floor, believe it or not, based on an inspection report we got from several years ago, it is still one of the best in the state.”

Councilwoman Powell asked, “Don’t they still play ball in there?”

“Yes.” replied **Mr. Capps**. “There are still some things going on there.”

“It would really be nice to have something that we could call a community park, like what they have over in Summerfield...something we could call our own,” said **Mr. Capps**.

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Mayor Paschal said, "They have one over in the Bethany community, too."

The **mayor** added, "Council looked into this once before...trying to get a committee together and fund them to do these things. Of course, once you get into it, you've got insurance issues and things like that. At that time, we were trying to stay separate and fund it but get someone else to look after it. As far as spearheading and trying to figure out if we want to lease or buy, we can talk to the County and get the ball rolling and see how it materializes."

Councilman Belcher added, "That's what I was thinking and we would need some time to research the liability issues and things like that..."

Mr. Capps commented, "I can shed some light on that because that was one of the questions we asked ourselves. A lot of the sports that we are in, involve other associations that we belong to. The Wentworth football team, the Rockingham County Football League, is actually a part of the American Youth Football Association, so you can carry insurance through those associations."

He continued, "As far as the liability insurance, there are riders to cover things that happen on the property, as part of the rental or lease agreement. There are things we can do to limit our liabilities and problems in those areas."

"Also," **Mr. Capps** added, "to address what you were saying...talking about getting the ball rolling, a Mr. (John) Jones went to the Wentworth PTA and asked for funding to help build a T-ball field, and it's a shame he had to do that because there are two diamonds cut out down here already."

He concluded, "There is plenty that can be done and people willing to take it on. I think it would more than pay for itself in terms of making some young people and their parents happy. Although it may not be profitable, I think we can more than cover the expense to break even."

Mayor Paschal asked if anyone else had questions for Mr. Capps.

Mayor Paschal then made a motion, "*That Council send another letter, a duplicate of the one we sent on September 17, 2007, initiating conversation with the county to try to set up a meeting about the lease on the building and land out there.*"

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Mayor Pro Tem Conner seconded the motion. There was no additional discussion. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

Article V. New Business – Continued

D. Committee Reports

(2) Appearance Committee – Consideration of Appearance Committee’s Request for Permission to Proceed with Implementation of “Community Pride” Award

Mayor Paschal noted that the Chairman of the Appearance Committee, Foresa Coe, is on vacation and that the Town Administrator would be presenting the information to Council.

Mrs. Ward called attention to an outline provided by Mrs. Coe, advising that the Appearance Committee has had four (4) meetings.

“They said they felt they needed to get acquainted with each other...I don’t think any of them knew one another. They have discussed possible projects, the need to recruit additional members—our Bylaws call for five (5) members. We have 5 people on the Recreation Committee, three on the Historic Preservation Committee and 3 on the Appearance Committee.”

Mrs. Ward commented, “Mayor Paschal, you skipped Item C under New Business, and that was to consider another person who has applied for the Appearance Committee, which would give us four members.”

She continued with the report—“The committee is interested in working on the appearance of a future site for recreational activities, and they have talked about a ‘Yard of the Month’ or “Community Pride” award. They are also working on the ‘Welcome to Wentworth’ sign that Council has already approved.”

Mayor Paschal asked, “Did we get approval from the church to locate the sign on their property?”

“Yes,” replied **Ms. Ward**, “and the Agreement was signed.”

Mrs. Ward continued, “The second part of the report has to do with the ‘Welcome to Wentworth’ sign. The committee wants to involve the community in the final design.”

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“One little problem they have run into,” said **Mrs. Ward**, “is that our zoning ordinance prohibits illumination of signs in that area. This will probably merit some conversation with our Planning Department and the Board. The Committee has asked me to inquire on the ListServ to see how other towns handle this type of zoning issue.”

“**Mrs. Coe** has spoken with the art instructor at RCC (Rockingham Community College) about design of the sign, and he says they will look at it when school begins in August. The art class at Rockingham County High School has been contacted as well and will be approached again when school starts.”

“Last, but not least,” **Mrs. Ward** said, “The Committee has decided that they would like to have a ‘Community Pride’ award, much like a ‘Yard of the Month,’ but they will recognize improvements to property, general appearance and/or attractive landscaping to both residential and non-residential properties.”

Mrs. Ward added, “The committee is in the process of developing the guidelines and criteria for this award, and what Foresa stressed in her email to me, is that she would really like to get your blessing on this. They want your permission to proceed with the Community Pride award, before they spend a lot of time coming up with guidelines and criteria, in case Council is not in favor of it.

Mayor Paschal asked, “Is there any discussion on the Community Pride award?”

Councilman Belcher said, “I think it sounds like an idea that might create more discussion about the Town itself and foster some community involvement.”

Mayor Pro Tem Conner commented, “They have presented a good outline, and I agree that we may need to look into the illumination of the sign.”

Mayor Paschal commented, “I think we are in agreement that they can bring their ideas on Community Pride back to us and we’ll take a look at it.”

Mrs. Ward asked, “So you do support it...”

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Councilman Belcher replied, "I think it is a good idea."

Mrs. Ward thanked the Council on behalf of the Appearance Committee.

Article V. New Business – Continued

C. Consideration of Application for Membership on Appearance Committee: (1) Ms. Dessa Scheffer / 880 NC 65, Wentworth, NC

Mayor Paschal said he would like to *go back to Item C under New Business* before moving ahead with the Agenda.

Councilman Belcher commented, "She seems to be very interested from what she has written on her application."

Councilwoman Powell made a motion, "*That we accept her on the Appearance Committee.*" **Councilman Belcher** seconded the motion.

There was no further discussion. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

**D. Committee Reports
(3) Historic Preservation Committee**

Mayor Paschal confirmed that no one was present to report on the Historic Preservation Committee.

Mrs. Ward advised that the Historic Preservation Committee also needs more members. She advised that Dr. Jerry Owens, Dr. Lindley Butler, and Mary Ann Evans are currently on the committee and have been looking into the historic properties in Wentworth. She encouraged anyone who may be interested in serving on the committee, to get an application from the Town office.

E. Certificate of Congratulations to the City of Reidsville for Being Designated an All-America City

Mayor Paschal recognized **Mayor Pro Tem Conner** who said she, "...would like to congratulate the City of Reidsville who was nominated as one of 16 finalists for a reward and recognition as an All-America City."

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“They were one of 10 cities selected nationally to receive the award, and they had 51 delegates from Reidsville who accompanied them to Tampa, Florida, to participate in the selection process.”

Mayor Pro Tem Conner advised that the award was made to the City of Reidsville on June 6th. She added, “I think it is an honor that a city from Rockingham County was selected.”

Councilwoman Powell commented, “I think they have done a real good job cleaning up the area around the monument and down through there.”

Mayor Pro Tem Conner read the Certificate of Congratulations addressed to Mayor James Festerman of the City of Reidsville.

Mayor Paschal made a motion, “*That we present Reidsville with the Certificate of Congratulations for being designated an All America City.*”

Mayor Pro Tem Conner seconded the motion. There was no further discussion. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

The **Town Administrator** said she would give the certificate to Reidsville City Manager, Kelly Almond, at the Managers’ Lunch on Thursday, “...since none of them could be here tonight.”

Article VI. New Business – Continued

F. Looking Back—Town of Wentworth (1998 – 2008)

Mayor Paschal recognized Town Administrator, **Brenda Ward**.

Mrs. Ward advised, “Don’t worry. I know it’s been a long meeting, and I’m not going to bore everyone with a long summary of what’s been going on for ten years. I started searching through ten years’ worth of Minutes and I got one of the worst headaches I’ve ever had, so I gave up on that project. However, I will tell you that the Town Council has done many good things for the Town, and you can read all about it...our minutes are on line, if you go to the Town website, there is a link that will take you to them.”

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Mrs. Ward continued, “I will tell you this, I was not hired until April of 1999. So, throughout the reactivation process and up to the time I was hired, these folks, some who aren’t currently serving on the Council, and perhaps some of you, were very busy and worked really hard to get things up and running. They reviewed the county ordinances, tweaking them to come up with our own, set up bank accounts and dealing with all that the State requires you to do...they have been really busy.”

She added, “It’s easy walking into a Town office with everything already set up and you just sit down and go to work, but just starting from scratch is quite different and they are to be commended for their hard work, along with all the others who helped out. We should all be very proud of them.”

Mayor Pro Tem Conner said she would like to commend the Town Clerk, commenting, “It wasn’t all set up when you came, either. You did a lot of the ground work.”

“Lots of fine tuning,” **Mayor Paschal** added.

The Clerk and Council agreed that there was a lot to learn, and said they “...are still learning.”

Article VI. New Business – Continued

G. Consideration of Approval of Contract with the Wright Company for Construction of Town Hall

Mayor Paschal recognized **Mr. Ken Stafford** with Alley, Williams, Carmen, and King, Inc.

Mr. Stafford explained to Council, “We are one step closer than we were a month ago, when we took the construction bids, but everything was still subject to approval from the Local Government Commission. We have now taken another step forward with their approval, the last big hoop we faced.”

“We have copies of the contract form for your perusal, just in case you wonder what we are talking about when we say we’ve got to approve a contract. It’s pretty straight-forward, not real exciting reading, but at least you’ll know a little bit more about what you’re obligating yourselves to.”

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Mr. Stafford continued, “There are still a few other hoops to jump through—the closing arrangements with your bank, which should happen in a couple of weeks. The Contract is dated the 22nd day of July and we expect all the bank arrangements to be closed.”

“We will be forwarding copies of this contract to our contractor, the Wright Company, and they will also be submitting signed copies back to me and to the Town, along with the necessary insurance and bond information. Once all that is done, Dennis (Mayor Paschal) will need to actually sign this contract. Hopefully, by thirty (30) days from now, by the time of your next Council meeting, there will be dirt flying out on the site. So, everything is in order.”

Mayor Paschal thanked Mr. Stafford and made a motion, *“That we award the contract to the Wright Company for construction of the Town Hall, subject to the paperwork being approved.”*

Mayor Pro Tem Conner seconded the motion. There was no discussion. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

Article VI. Speaker Register

Mayor Paschal recognized **Mrs. Glenda Koops** of 219 Timberwood Trace in University Estates.

Mrs. Koops distributed copies of a petition from residents of University Estates, along with photos of various speed limit signs in the general area in question (Tall Trees Lane-Kilmer Lane-Cedar Lane-and Timberwood Trace).

The petition asked for a change in the speed limit on Tall Trees Lane from 20 miles per hour to 30 miles per hour. The residents stated in the petition, “We feel that we are being singled out compared to the rest of University Estates (across from Cedar Lane).”

Mrs. Koops stated her address as 219 Timberwood Trace in Reidsville. She thanked Council for giving her the opportunity to speak, “on behalf of my neighborhood.”

She advised, “Several months ago we came home to find a 20 mph speed limit sign posted in Mr. (John) Pergerson’s back yard. We were not aware that there was a speed issue or that a sign was going to be posted. Recently, the Sheriff’s Department and State Troopers have been patrolling our neighborhood.”

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Mrs. Koops stated that the Sheriff and State Troopers, "...have better things to do than look for someone going over 20 miles per hour...we are a quiet, friendly, neighborhood, and we feel we are being singled out, compared to the rest of University Estates. We don't mind a speed limit sign, but please make it fair. Lasley Lane, Whip O Will, Clifton and Shadowood, all have 30 mile per hour posting."

Mrs. Koops noted that the petition includes signatures, "from the rest of the residents on Timberwood Trace, Kilmer Lane, and Tall Trees."

She thanked Council for their time.

Mrs. Rita Troxler addressed Council, saying, "I have lived on Cedar Lane for 40 years. When they put Kilmer and Timberwood Trace in, about a mile long, dead end both ways...that's where I walk because it is much safer than Cedar Lane."

Mrs. Troxler added, "For the past 8 to 12 years, I walk *their* street 3 times a day with my dogs and never have felt even *slightly* threatened...no cars speeding, very few cars at all—just a few residents coming in and out during the day and that's not often. So, I don't know the reason why the speed limit would have been changed from 30 to 20. There is no danger *at 30.*"

Councilwoman Powell commented, "Someone from your neighborhood asked for it to be changed."

Mayor Paschal said, "Yes, and Robert Aswell, a council member who is not here tonight, went out there and talked to some folks on the road, too, not just that one person, and evidently found some other people who were in agreement with it. But without him being here..."

Mrs. Troxler and other residents advised that they have one hundred percent signatures from everyone on the street.

Mayor Paschal said that not only Mr. Aswell went out to the area, but the Sheriff's deputies, "and talked with them."

Mrs. Troxler commented, "I think it's a personality issue. A new person comes in and thinks, 'I'm going to rule this place.'"

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Another resident said, "I would like to know who they talked to."

Councilman Belcher commented that a Highway Patrolman was at the Town Council meeting the night the request was made to lower the speed limit.

Mrs. Troxler continued, "It amazes me that this person got this done for that street, when Cedar Lane has been a race track for years. I called Sam Page, I called the Highway Patrol a few years back. Nothing was done."

Mayor Paschal replied, "Y'all have got enough signatures here, would you like to get the speed limit reduced on Cedar Lane?"

One of the residents commented, "Cedar Lane is slow enough."

Mrs. Troxler disagreed, saying, "Cedar Lane, across the street from me, is very dangerous...it's a race track. It just needs to be controlled."

Mrs. Troxler said the Highway Patrol told her they "do not do stationery," and that Sheriff Page told her he would have some deputies out there, "...and it has gotten better," she said.

Mrs. Troxler commented, "It amazes me that their little dead end street, on both ends, gets patrolled...I have never seen as many law enforcement cars on Kilmer and Timberwood Trace since this one person moved into the neighborhood. It amazes me."

Mayor Paschal commented, "The squeaky wheel gets the oil." He asked Mrs. Troxler, "Did you say you do or don't want the speed limit lowered out there (Cedar Lane)?"

Mrs. Troxler replied, "It has been lowered, but it did no good. I want some enforcement out there."

Mayor Paschal thanked Mrs. Troxler for her comments.

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The next speaker was **John Pergerson**, who said he lives on the corner of Tall Trees and Cedar Lane. **Mr. Pergerson** advised, "I see everything! Most of us feel like criminals down there with all the law enforcement we've been seeing. I talked to a trooper who was there for an hour every morning at 20 minutes after six. Our tax dollars are paying for a trooper to sit down there for an hour to watch six cars come up the road, when he could be out on (NC) 14 catching 70 mph drivers."

Mayor Paschal replied, "We didn't send the trooper out there."

Mr. Pergerson said, "I know that, but I don't understand how one person could have this kind of clout to do this. I don't know how he went about it."

Councilman Belcher remarked, "He was vocal, he made his request, and that's how you get things done. He had a representative from the Highway Patrol here and was in contact with them, I would assume, numerous times."

Mr. Pergerson said, "He (?) lives one house down in this cul-de-sac... how fast, unless you have a hot rod, are you going to go, past his house?"

Mayor Paschal commented, "We understand, but like I said, Robert (Councilman Aswell) went out there and he may have talked to some folks he knew, and we'll find out between now and the next meeting..."

Mrs. Troxler added, "There were no problems. It was simply an attitude that moved into the neighborhood." **Mr. Pergerson** agreed, saying, "Nobody speaks to this man. Nobody."

Mayor Paschal asked, "Are there no kids down there, riding on bicycles and playing? When I used to visit friends down there, we would get out on bicycles and ride."

The consensus of the group was that there are some kids in the area, "...but they don't run up and down the streets, they stay at their houses."

Mr. Pergerson pointed out, "If you notice the sign there (in photo), it says 'Subdivision Speed Limit 20 mph, All Streets.' University Estates is the same subdivision." He noted also that the markings on the sign are an indication that, "even the birds don't like it."

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The next speaker was **Vern Koops** of 219 Timberwood Trace, who said he just had one question, “How can there be a street on one side of the road and on the next street, the speed limit is entirely different. Who enforces those laws?”

Mayor Paschal replied, “The Sheriff and the Highway Patrol.”

Mr. Koops asked, “So one street, and then a block later, you can have a speed limit less than a school zone. I don’t understand how...you say he talked to one or two people or the Sheriff, how one person can change our community without talking to the rest.”

“Did whoever presented this information to you have all these signatures? How many signatures did they have?” **Mr. Koops** asked.

Mayor Paschal replied, “They had the Highway Patrol, and the Sheriff’s Department, and like I said, we sent somebody over there. **Robert Aswell** went over there and said, ‘I’ve talked to some people over there and there is a problem.’”

“But are they documented?” asked **Mr. Koops**.

Mayor Paschal replied, “It is documented in our Minutes as to what...”

The mayor was interrupted by **Mr. Pergerson** who said, “Well, several people out here in the audience live there and he never talked to any of these.”

After simultaneous comments from several residents at once, **Mr. Koops** concluded, “All we’re really asking for is your guidance and direction.”

The **mayor** responded, “I understand what you’re asking for, and what we will do is talk to Robert and talk to the Sheriff, and just like we did before when we were presented with the request to lower the speed limit, we take it all into account and will make a decision at our next council meeting in August.”

The **Town Administrator** asked the Mayor to explain that any final decision is made by the Department of Transportation.

Mayor Paschal agreed and **Councilman Belcher** said, “That’s right, we have to make a request to them...”

Mayor Paschal said again, “We will take it into consideration and we appreciate you coming.”

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Article VI. Speaker Register – Continued

Mayor Paschal recognized **Ms. Bonnie Dickens** with **ReDirections**.

Ms. Dickens thanked Council for giving her time to speak.

“I wanted to take the opportunity on behalf of our Board of Directors, the volunteers, and staff, to say congratulations, Wentworth, on ten years.”

“I also want to say thank you from the bottom of our hearts for all the support the Town Council has given our agency, for the Peer Mediation program at the Middle School and for the Conflict Resolution classes at Rockingham High. The instructors were very, very pleased when they called us in June before they left for the summer, to find out that they are going to get the programs again this year. I want to thank you from the bottom of my heart.”

The **Mayor and Council** thanked Ms. Dickens for her remarks.
